Baby Faith is 8 weeks old. Left at feed store severely dehydrated and malnourished. She’s only 2.7 lbs but should be closer to 8 lbs. Doesn’t know how to eat on her own yet. Syringe feeding 5 cc at a time and providing IV fluids until she is strong enough to eat on her own.



Duke & Dutchess

Duke (on the right and center) and Duchess came to us at 10 pm on a work night as the last two surviving pups in a litter of 14. Originally less than 1lb each they struggled to stay alive. Little troopers that they are they soon thrived at over 35 lbs by 3 months. “little” Duke unfortunately lost his sight to an infection before his eyes ever opened. Due to his size and playful demeanor it was determined by the vet that the eyes needed to be removed to prevent future injury and to relieve the constant discomfort that was being caused by the eyelids irritated the eyes. The first surgery was unsuccessful when he reacted poorly to the anesthetic and we almost lost him. He is scheduled for another surgery next month (with a new sedation plan). The surgery will be **another** \$900. With the hours an hours spent keeping this little guy alive he is officially going to be a foster failure but when the fosters so generously took them in at 4 days old we were all unaware of the financial burden that would come with the commitment. While they have contributed significantly we still need more help. Please consider contributing to his surgery. They’ve already done so much, let’s see what we can do!

Many of you may remember Tex’s story from the news. His 91 year old owner had to go for food in last year’s ice storm and was found passed away in the ice later the next day. He was the only family Tex had ever known and it has taken him a while to recover from the loss. He would be a perfect pet for an older man who needs a perfect companion to share his time with.




Tank
